3. RESOLUTION IN RE:

THE LICENSING AND
REGULATING AGENCIES
OF AUTOMOBILE
GRAVEYARDS FOR
SULLIVAN CO., TN

BE IT RESOLVED THAT WHEREAS, the County Commission has passed a resolution asking the Sullivan County Legislative Delegation to the General Assembly for the adoption of a private act concerning the regulation and licensing of automobile graveyards in Sullivan County, Tennessee.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT when the legislative delegation offically passes this private ac the Sullivan County Board of Commissioners immediately adopt the following regulations in order that they may enforce said private act.

ALSO, BE IT UNDERSTOOD Sullivan County "Automobile Graveyard" defined: Means any lot or place which is exposed to the weather and upon which more than five (5) motor vehicles of any kind incapable of being operated and which it would not be economically practical to make operative, are placed, located or found. "Automobile Junkyard" shall be construed to mean establishments having permanent facilities to crush cars. The above operation must also sell parts from unoperative cars on said lot before crushing them. Let it Further Be Understood that "Automobile Junkyards" shall not be construed to mean: car auction companies, automobile renting and leasing companies, automobile repair and service companies, automobile used car dealers, gasoline service stations or automobile storage companies.

- 1. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Sullivan County Tax Assessor's Office shall license said auto graveyards that are within 1,000 feet of Sullivan County roads, subdivisions, hospitals, churches or schools. It shall be the responsibility of said auto graveyard owners to submit a certified survey of the present and future boundaries of said graveyards to the Sullivan County Tax Assessor's Office within three months of passage of this county act.
- 2. The above licensing agency shall:
 - A. Eliminate pollution problems caused by certain auto graveyards to lakes, streams and natural drains. The licensing agency shall require the owners to set back said automobiles 100 feet from such waterways.
 - B. For the sake of protection and safety the licensing agency shall require the automobile graveyard owners to erect a six-foot high chain link fence that will encompass the automobile graveyards.
 - C. All said auto graveyards in Sullivan County will be given six months to comply with above regulations.
- The enforcing agency of said auto graveyards shall be the Sullivan County Sheriff's Department.
- Civil fines for violations of such regulations shall not be in excess of twenty-five (25) dollars per each violation.
- 5. If subdivisions, hospitals, churches or schools are established or constructed next to auto graveyards the said graveyards shall not be required to re-locate their boundaries in order to meet the requirements of Section 1 of this strument.

9. RESOLUTION IN RE:

ZONING PLAN FOR SULLIVAN COUNTY

BE IT RESOLVED THAT WHEREAS, the proper and sensible development of Sullivan County in order to prevent a haphazard, disorganized, unthinking, aimless, and almost irrevocable development calls for some plan to provide guidance and rules in the further development and growth of the County, and

WHEREAS, many problems that have come up in the past, that are coming up at the present and that will arise in the future to trouble Sullivan County such as the location of automobile junkyards, the location of message parlors, the location of beer selling establishments, location of garbage sites and sanitary landfills, location of trailer parks, to only mention some, could have been more easily dealt with in the past and could be more easily dealt with at the present and in the future, if not completely avoided if a good zoning ordinance existed, and

WHEREAS, expensive acquisitions of land in connection with road improvements could be avoided or minimized if adequate setback rules existed, and

WHEREAS, the investment of a citizen in a home, which is often a lifetime investment, needs some protective shield for his home and neighborhood against the encroachment of those who feel they can do what they want to do with their land even if it damage their neighbor, forgetting that they are but mere stewards of the land, and

WHEREAS, Sullivan County, several years ago authorized an in depth study on zoning, and,

WHEREAS, much work, effort, and expense was put into the study, and much data and information was developed, and public hearings were held on the subject, and

WHEREAS, a proposed Zoning Ordinance was drafted and was put on the agenda by Court letter dated September 18, 1973, for the October 15, 1973, Session of County Court, but was deferred for further study by Court letter dated October 9, 1973, before it reached the full Court for discussion, and was not brought up again until earlier this year by resolution proposing a re-examination of the subject at which time consideration was again shelved, and

WHEREAS, even if one takes the position that the plan previously proposed has objectionable parts in its makeup, the previously proposed plan could serve as a starting point from which through honest, open, and objective debate and discussion, and through modification, amendment, give and take, and leaving out the bad and including the good, an acceptable plan could be drawn up, and

WHEREAS, the need still demands the issue not be buried, but revived, addressed, and dealt with in open session eventually permitting the Board to take a stand,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of County Commissioners put on its work agenda in good faith the task of coming up with an acceptable plan to be brought before the Board of County Commissioners for vote no later than its January, 1981, Regular Session.

12. RESOLUTION IN RE:

SUSPENSION OF RULES

BE IT RESOLVED THAT WHEREAS, there continues to be an increasing tendency for members of the Board of County Commissioners as there was in the old County Court when introducing resolutions to ask for a suspension of the rules and a vote on the first reading, and

WHEREAS, following this type of procedure results in hasty consideration of important resolutions without adequate opportunity to study and consider the resolution, to verify and check out the arguments for and against the resolution, and to check with those represented as to their opinions on the resolution, and

WHEREAS, this frequent use of suspending the rules should be discouraged,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT in order for a resolution to be passed on the first reading in addition to the 2/3 vote requirement the resolution shall meet one of the following requirements:

- That the resolution shall have been filed with the County Court Clerk's office
 at least seven days prior to the time for voting, and a complete copy of that
 resolution shall have been mailed or distributed to each member of the Board
 of County Commissioners at least seven days prior to the time for voting with
 a statement of intention to call the resolution up for a vote on the first
 reading, or
- That resolution shall be classified as an emergency resolution. An emergency resolution shall be defined as a resolution
 - a. Which if it were not passed at the session of its first introduction would result because of time requirements in making it useless and without benefit to pass it at a subsequent session, or

- b. Which is required because of a maintenance or service problem resulting from a breakdown, destruction, or loss of use of equipment that cannot safely or reasonably be done without until a second reading at a subsequent session, or
- 3. A resolution solely in the nature of a proclamation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT in the event a resolution meets the requirements under number two and three for passing on first reading there shall be the further requirements:

- That the resolution be filed at the beginning of the session on which it is to be voted with a notation on the resolution that it will be called up for passage on the first reading later during the meeting,
- That a copy of the resolution be given to each member of the Board of Commissioners
 present with a notation on the resolution that it will be called up for passage
 on the first reading,
- That the resolution not be voted on until all matters on second reading first be considered
- 4. That no knowledge shall have been had by the introducer of the emergency or need to pass the resolution as an emergency resolution on first reading prior to ten days before the session at which it is called up for first reading.

13. RESOLUTION IN RE:

TCA 54-1015 AND
AMENDMENT OF
TCA 12-701

BE IT RESOLVED THAT WHEREAS TCA 54-1015 under the County Uniform Road Law which was passed on March 28, 1974, and approved April 5, 1974, states among other things "that the county governing body shall have the authority to authorize the county road department to perform work for other government entities provided the cost of the projects so authorized are to be reimbursed to the county road department," and

WHEREAS this statute in effect would mean that the City of Kingsport and the City of Bristol could get the Sullivan County Road Department to do work within the cities but that they would have to pay for it with the resultant use of city tax dollars.

WHEREAS TCA 12-701 prohibits a county from selling, trading, bartering or giving away the product of any hot mix asphalt plant or facility and further prohibits the selling, trading, bartering or giving away any stone products; and

WHEREAS, this second statute in effect means there is a prohibition against even th selling of hot mix or any stone products to the City of Birstol or the City of King or in addition to the prohibition against giving these to these two cities.

WHEREAS, we have here one statute that permits selling and another that prohibits selling in addition to giving away, and

WHEREAS city property owners pay county property taxes on the county highway tax rate the same as county property owners and should receive a fair share of benefits from this highway tax rate without having to pay for them.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Sullivan County Board of Commissioners go on record as requesting that the Tennessee legislature amend these two statutes so that property owners within the cities could get the benefits of road materials or work from the county government within the county which they are located without having to pay for them, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon passage of this resolution a copy of it be sent to the Tennessee legislative delegation from Sullivan County.

SIGNALS AT INTERSECTION OF US 23 AN
EXIT RAMPS OF I-81

WHEREAS, although a full clover leaf would have been the answer to the problem here, the intersections could be made much safer with the installation of traffic control signals,

Wilson, submitted his report for the period ending December 31, 1979, which report was received and adopted by a voice vote of the County Commission and filed with the Clerk as a matter of record. Ladies and Gentlemen:

I trust that the holiday season has been a joyous occasion for each of you and I would like to wish you the very best in the coming year. I would like to thank you for your support in the past year, and ask for your continuing support as we try to provide a quality education program for the boys and girls in Sullivan County.

This past year has brought about greater opportunities for students, particularly in the opening of Rock Springs, Central Heights, and Holston Elementary Schools. I hope you were able to attend the open house at Rock Springs and Central Heights at the beginning of this school year. Open house has been scheduled at Holston Elementary and Middle School on Sunday, January 20, 1980, from 2:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. You will receive an invitation giving more detail about this event. The elementary part of the building was ready for students at the beginning of this school year. The middle school students have been using the old Holston building but will now transfer to the new facilities and begin classes January 21.

The architects and general contractors have assured me that both North and South High Schools will be ready for the opening of the 1980-81 school year. Some of the personnel have already been assigned to these schools. Appointments made to date include the following: principals, assistant principals, librarians, music teachers, band directors, and head coaches in basketball (boys and girls), football, and swimming.

At its October meeting, the Board of Education initiated the process of textbook adoption by approving eight textbook committees. These committees consist of thirty-five classroom teachers working under the direction of staff members from the elementary, middle, and high school curriculum areas. They will review over 400 texts in the areas of agriculture, home economics, health, science, and health occupations before making final recommendations to the Board in April 1980. The textbooks which they select will be purchased for use beginning July 1, 1980 and will be used through June 30, 1985. This adoption process is in accordance with regulations established by the Department of Education and policies approved by the Sullivan County Board of Education.

National emphasis is now being placed on improved nutrition; the school food service facility provides a natural, available resource to supplement nutrition-oriented experiences. Two schools, Brookside and Mary Hughes, are participating in the Nutrition Education Team Program, a part of the State plan to expand nutrition education. A team consisting of a cafeteria manager and a teacher from each school attended a week's workshop at ETSU this past summer. They developed plans to involve their classes in a nutrition education experience to achieve better participation in the food service program and to reduce plate waste. The classes will be monitored to determine if the goals are reached. Another opportunity in the area of nutrition education is the two-hour workshop planned January 17-18 for all kindergarten through fifth grade teachers.

For the first time in Sullivan County's history, a special education student went to the State Special Olympics accompanied by his classmates, teachers, and principal. Jerry Cowden, a twelve-year-old student at Cedar Grove School, won first place in both the local and regional bowling tournaments. He then became eligible to participate at the State level where he won a Silver Medal for second place. After accompanying Jerry to the competition and Awards Banquet, the class visited the State Capitol, the Legislative Plaza, and the Governor's Office. This never-to-be forgotten trip was made possible through contributions from citizens, business and civic groups, and Sullivan County P.T.A.'s.

The Sullivan County Board of Education filed an appeal of Chancellor Dayton E. Phillips' November 8th ruling which forbids a decertification election

until 1981. The Board also voted to continue suspension of negotiations with the Sullivan County Education Association pending the decision of the Appeals Court. The appeal will be forwarded from Blountville to the Tennessee Court of Appeals in Knoxville. The Sullivan County Board of Education broke off talks with the Sullivan County Education Association August 3, 1979 after the Board received petitions asking for a decertification election. The Elizabethton teachers have also presented a petition to their Board of Education asking for a decertification election.

In my last report I mentioned some of the overcrowded conditions of buses at the beginning of the school year. This was due mostly to rezoning and the fact that fewer parents are transporting their children to school because of high gasoline prices. Most of the overcrowded buses were in the Miller Perry and Rock Springs area. By adding on new buses, reassigning students, and changing some bus routes, we have been able to correct these overcrowded conditions. In years when it is necessary to make many changes such as reassignment of students to a different school or to a different bus, etc., we get more inquiries from parents than in years when there are few changes. I feel that this year and next year will bring some of the most progressive advancements in the history of Sullivan County Schools which will provide greater opportunities for students to receive a good education.

Because of the opening of the two new high schools and the establishment of middle schools in the lower end of the county, we will have another year of many changes: new bus routes, reassignment of students and teachers, rezoning, etc. Although our staff and Board are spending many hours of planning and preparation for a smooth beginning next year, we will probably again get more inquiries than in normal years. Next year we will complete our reorganization plan for our schools (elementary K-5, middle schools 6-8, high schools 9-12). . I hope you will understand some of the problems in the years of progress and change and I ask for your cooperation.

Let me assure you that I share your concern about the correction of any problems we might have with any of our buses. Safe transportation for our students must be one of our top priorities. I believe we have one of the top bus systems, if not the top, in the State of Tennessee. However, if out of the 128 buses that transport more than 16,000 students each day, we have one bus that is not safe that is one too many. We will do what is necessary to correct any unsafe situations we might have. If a bus is found unsafe it will discontinue service until corrections have been made. Bus inspections are now scheduled twice a year, with spot checks throughout the year. New bus drivers are now required to participate in a training program. Bus drivers now in service are required to take a training program every three years. Both state and federal standards for buses have become more rigid in recent years.

Maintaining good discipline on our school buses is also a major concern. Last year the Board of Education approved a list of rules and regulations for students riding buses. Our bus supervisor and principals representing elementary, middle, and high schools helped develop these policies. Enclosed are a copy of the rules and regulations and some related forms used in the implementation of the policies.

I appreciate your support for our education program this past year and look forward to working with you this year in meeting our responsibility for providing quality education for the boys and girls in Sullivan County.

At the beginning of each year a statement of Rules and Regulations shall be 0217sent home with each bus rider for his parents to read and sign and return to the School principal.

- Rules and Regulations Students who ride school buses shall abide by the following rules and regulations:
 - 1. Student must be at the designated stop at the scheduled time, stand back about ten feet from the readway and wait until the door is opened before moving closer to the bus. He shall not play on the highway or road. If student misses the bus, he shall not attempt to hitch-hike a ride or walk to or from school without written permission from parents.
 - 2. While the bus is loading or unloading, students will enter or leave the bus orderly and quickly.
 - 3. While riding the bus, students are under the supervision of the driver and shall obey the driver at all times.
 - 4. Students shall conduct themselves in such a manner that they will not distract the attention of the bus driver or disturb other riders on the bus.
 - 5. Students will not be allowed to bring knives or sharp objects of any kind, fire-arms, pets or other living animals on the bus. Students must remain in seat at all times.
 - 6. If there is no seat available, students shall stand in the aisle of the bus facing the front and hold to seat rail.
 - 7. Students shall not tamper with any of the safety devices such as door latches and fire extinguishers.
 - 8. Students should not put their hands, arms, head, or bodies out of the
 - 9. Students should not yell at anyone outside or inside the bus, but should speak softly.
 - \10. Students must not deface or litter the bus. They will not write on the bus or damage seats, throw objects or otherwise distract the driver.
 - 11. Smoking while riding the bus shall not be permitted.
 - Students are to keep aisles of the bus clear of books, lunches, coats and feet.
 - 13. Students should not ask the dirver to let them off the bus at any other place except their regular stop without written approval from a parent or
 - 14. Students who must cross the road or highway to enter the bus shall always try to be on the right side of the road while waiting for the bus. If student arrives at the stop just as the bus approaches the stop, he must wait until the bus comes to a complete stop and the driver has signaled for him to cross in front of the bus. (Unless the driver directs him differently).
 - 15. Students who must cross the road after leaving the bus in the afternoon must go to a point on the shoulder of the road ten feet in front of the bus and cross the road only after the driver has signaled him to cross.
 - 16. Vulgar or abusive language shall not be permitted.
 - 17. Food or drinks shall not be consumed on bus.
 - No alcoholic beverages or drugs will be permitted on any school bus. These rules may not cover all the "do's" and "don'ts", but should serve as a guide for students' conduct while on a school bus. Any questions concerning these policies should be referred to the Principal or Supervisor of Transportation.

Agricultural Work Area

The Sullivan County Livestock Association in cooperation with neighboring counties and the Kingsport Livestock Market planned and held their first Feeder Calf sale on October 3, 1979. Local producers consigned 1,150 feeder calves to the sale that were graded by state graders and pinned into uniform groups according to weight. Beef cattle producers as well as buyers seemed to be pleased with the newly organized auction sale.

The organized Feeder Calf sales across the state have returned \$3 to \$5 per hundred weight on the average to producers when compared to other marketing methods.

On October 16, an Energy Farm Field Day was held at the Charles Cleek Dairy Farm in Kingsport to show dairymen and others the results of the heat recovery system being used to transfer heat from the warm milk being cooled to heat water for use in the dairy. Data collected from the demonstration shows that the system could be used successfully by diarymen and save 30¢ per cow per month in electric cost to heat needed water.

In November the feeder pig producers were surveyed to determine the educational programs that would be needed for the next 5 years. Efficiency is real important to feeder pig producers since they have had the squeeze put on them during the past quarter with lower prices being paid for pigs and higher feed cost.

In December, an education meeting was conducted at the Extension Auditorium in Blountville with 15 swine producers to bring them up-to-date on the latest recommendations and production practices.

On December 4, the Sullivan County Dairy Herd Improvement Association Annual Meeting was held with 18 dairymen attending. Mr. V. D. Parsons, Dairy Specialist from the University of Tennessee, presented certificates of recognition to Gordon Mills, Bluff City for 18,462 pounds of milk and 695 pounds of butter fat; Harr Brother, Bluff City for 18,730 pounds of milk and 660 pounds of butterfat; Charles Allen Cleek, Kingsport for 17,581 pounds of milk and 627 pounds of butterfat; B.A. and R.W. Jones, Blountville for 16, 159 pounds of milk and 619 pounds of butterfat and Ike Fleenor, Bristol for 16,726 pounds of milk and 603 pounds of butter-fat.

Sullivan County tobacco producers have had some what of a disappointing year. Normally the county has some 3000 tobacco quotes with approximately 1700 growers producing about 3.4 million pounds of tobacco that sells for approximately 4.5 million dollars. The totals have not been compiled for this market year, but a conservative estimate would be 30 to 35 percent loss due to excessive moisture and Blue Mold.

In addition to the daily routine work Extension Agents assisted producers in getting 920 soil tests in 1979 and making recommendations for individuals es requested.

Home Economics Work Area

At the annual fall meeting of home demonstration clubs, 86 members participated in a historical tour of the Bristol area of the county. We had the excellent help of Mrs. George Barnes and the Historical Society.

Another opportunity for study was available when a bus tour was taken to Washington, D.C. and the Amish area of Pennsylvania, as well as Valley Forge and Philadelphia. Thirty-two made the trip.

In April the agent visited 5 states on a scholarship grant to study the Extension programs. During the past quarter each Extension district in Tennessee was visited where a report was made on that study tour.

The first 11 weeks segment of a new weight control program was completed with the assistance of Mary Salyer, County Mutritionist. Thirty ladies participated with pounds lost varying from less than 5 to 18. This will be an on-going program for at least two years. It is called W 0 W (Weight-Off-Wisely).

We've been using many methods to inform area people of the pros and cons of heating with wood and the use of wood burners.

Home Demonstration club leaders were given training in subject matter creas to help in the on-going local club program. Femily Life leaders heard Dr. Andrew Spence speak of communication among femily members and the parent-child relationship; health leaders heard a program on safe handling of prescription and over-the-counter drugs and toured the Beecham Laboratories; home management leaders studied the subject of decision making; while reading leaders received training to help encourage members to read wisely.

The annual craft show was held in time for members to present ideas and methods for making holiday gifts and decoration to interested homemakers coming by boothes in the Kingsport Mall.

A workshop in holiday crafts was also held for "Headstort" mothers in Kingsport. Thirty-six attended and made a variety of items.

We continue with weakly radio program on WGOC and WOPI and weekly columns in all area newspapers. Our aim is to give homemakers up-to-date information related to all areas of family living.

4-H and Other Youth Work Area

This quarter began with organizing and enrolling approximately 4,000 boys and girls in 117 4-H clubs throughout the county. Project material was distributed to all 4-H members and volunteer leaders recruited for the clubs.

The 49th Achievement Day program was held in Eristol on October 5. Approximately sixteen 4-H clubs with over three hundred boys and girls participated in the marching parade. Fifty trophies were awarded to outstanding 4-H'ers during the program.

District and State judging activities during this quarter involved sixteen 4-H ers. They competed in district competition in land judging and wildlife judging. On the state level our dairy foods judging team placed second and our contestant in the chicken barbeque placed third.

County 4-H Officers training meetings were held in both Bristol and Kingsport with 238 4-H ers attending.

A county Citizenship Shortcourse was conducted by the Women of the Farm Bureau and the Sullivan County Extension Office to acquaint young people with their county government and officials. Thirtynine 4-H'ers attended.

A week-end Leadership Retreat was held for junior high and senior 4-H members involving twenty-one 4-H'ers.

During November 4-H clubs were given a program on Sullivan County's bicentennial. 4-H'ers were encouraged to interview older people and research our history for a "Happy Birthday-Sullivan County!" Issay Contest. One hundred thirteen essays were submitted by the 4-H'ers.

Seventy-nine 4-H'ers competed in Area Public Speaking contests in Kingsport and Bristol. Twenty-eight 4-H'ers were selected from these areas to participate in the County Public Speaking Finals in Blountville.

Christmas draft contests were held in all 117 4-H clubs during December.

A special- interest project group with twelve members was organized during this quarter for the 4-H'ers in the Dairy project.

Twenty-one 4-H members have obtained 32 steers and mineteen 4-H'ers have 35 beef heifers that they are raising for the Bristol Spring Show and Sale.

The District All-Star Winter Conference was held in Knowville on December 21. Eleven 4-H'ers and two agents attended the conference and presented a report of All-Star achievements for the past year.

17. RESOLUTION IN RE:

CAR GUIDELINES

BE IT RESOLVED THAT WHEREAS, the Sullivan County Quarterly Court directed that car guidelines be prepared.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the following car guidelines be approved:

Consideration should be given to the purpose for which the vehicle is to be used and the most economical size which will meet the need and insure the comfort and safety of the operator and other occupants should be requisitioned.

Addition of air conditioning and positive traction differential should be considered carefully. For example, cars used primarily for short trips and truck cabs should not be equipped with air conditioning.

It is recognized that ambulances, Sheriff Department vehicles, and others which might have standard guidelines must be purchased accordingly.

No vehicles are to be purchased having the following accessories at extra cost: cruise control; car radio; tape deck; and clock.

Except in instances when the cost would be greater, bids should be written to include: standard wheel covers; standard interior; small V-8 or 5-cylinder engine.

To aid in determining the optimum vehicle replacement time, an accurate and complete record should be maintained by the department head for each vehicle and should inloude: date of purchase; make and model of vehicle; motor number; maintenance expenditures; date and mileage; repair costs; date and mileage.

EMERGENCY PURCHASING

The State Auditors for the past several years have criticized Sullivan County Offices for excessive use of what has been termed "Emergency Purchases."

It is the opinion of the County Commission that many of the purchases being made on an "emergency" basis could have been purchased through the normal purchasing channels if the responsible department head had adequately planned for future needs.

We understand that many instances, which cannot be readily foreseen, arise which necessitate the immediate purchase of materials and/or supplies so that our county government can continue to efficiently and economically operate. There are, however, several purchases being made which don't fit into the above situation.

- (1) Emergency purchases should be made only if equipment, vehicles, or facilities have been rendered inoperable and there is an immediate need for said equipment, vehicles or facilities which necessitates emergency repairs.
- (2) Under no circumstance could the purchase of items in bulk be considered an emergency.
- (3) Purchases of capital outlay items should not be made on an emergency \(\frac{1}{2} \)
 basis.
- (4) Purchases of routine repair parts should not be made on an emergency basis.
- (5) Purchases of supplies and materials which were forgotten until the last minute should not be made on an emergency basis if the result of the delay will only be the inconvenience of the negligent department.

Department heads are reminded that by planning for future needs in advance, we can take advantage of the benefits of competitive bids. With each department heads' assistance, we will be able to limit "emergency" purchases only to the items which without, the "public will suffer."

The Director of Accounts and Budgets and/or the Purchasing Agent are directed to report any seeming irregularities in emergency purchasing to the attention of the Executive Committee.

WHEREAS, the County has requested the City to receive and house juve iles in the City Jail when requested to do so by County Authorities for juveni living in Sullivan County within the jurisdiction of the Ceneral Sessions Coun Division I; and,

WHEREAS, the City is willing to accept such juveniles upon the conditions hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. The City will receive and house juveniles in the City Jail upon request of County officials when such juveniles are from the territory of jurdiction of General Sessions Court, Division I.
- 2. No more than two male juveniles and two female juveniles shall! housed in said Jail at any one time.
- 3. The County will pay to the City the sum of \$12.00 per day for the feeding and general care of each juvenile so confined.
- 4. In addition to the daily cost, the County will pay to the City actual medical expenses involving any of said juveniles, actual expenses for damages done to the Jail by the juveniles and expenses for any increase in the liability insurance coverage experienced by the City.
- 5. Upon request by the City, the County will make available to the City personnel from the Sheriff's Department or such other personnel required to provide custodial service at the Jail for any period of time so required; that upon the request of the Chief of Police, the Shift Captain or the Dispatching Sergeant, the County will make County personnel available within one hour and if said County personnel is not so available, the County will receiv the juveniles from the City Jail who will be transported to Blountville.
