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

The following report of activities during the past quarter should be self-explanatory.

We have exhausted our supply of "Stop", "Speed 25 M.P.H." and "Speed 35 M.P.H." signs. Said signs are presently on order and are due to be shipped within the next few days.

There are several roads within the County where road signs are down and/or rusted, and should be replaced and/or repainted. Many complaints have been reported from our rescue units and fire departments stating that certain roads cannot be located because there are no signs.

Road signs, I might add, are not exempt from the high rate of inflation. Recently, I purchased two (2) twelve-foot round posts, used for erecting said signs, and they cost me seventeen dollars and fifty-six cents (\$17.56) per post from a local vendor.

Although, we are running behind on resolutions and daily complaints reference road signs, my helper and I are trying to do the best job we possibly can.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The Sullivan County School System began the 1980-81 school year with educational facilities that will provide all students in Sullivan County with equal educational opportunities. All students are now attending schools designed for their grade level and will be with students of similar ages. Our school system now consists of 29 elementary schools (K-5), 9 middle schools (6-8) and 4 comprehensive high schools (9-12). Provision is made for those who need a special educational program at Gunnings. We have a total of 18,999 students enrolled in our regular program K-12 and 111 students who enrolled in special education programs.

The opening of the two new high schools necessitated a great amount of work and preparation in such things as teacher assignments, furnishings, revamping of bus routes, etc. Considering the many changes, I thought we got off to an exceptionally good start this year. The completion of the new high schools and the establishment of the middle schools have made it possible for all kindergarten classes to be housed in our elementary buildings. For many years part of our kindergarten classes have been housed in local churches.

Mr. Charles Bridwell has been elected as chairman of the Sullivan County Board of Education. Dr. Gerald Gilbert was elected to serve as vice-chairman. Mr. Bridwell has served the Board as vice-chairman before his election as chairman.

A statewide census of all handicapped children in Tennessee, from birth through age 21, is currently being conducted by local school systems. Access to a free, appropriate public education for handicapped children in Tennessee is mandated at age four, and at age three for deaf children. Handicapped children are included in the census from birth to aid school systems in planning special education programs.

As in the past, a six-week summer program was offered at Gunnings School this past summer. Activities included bowling, swimming, and continued academic work.

Phonic ear auditory trainers have been purchased for three hearing impaired children in a new program now offered at Indian Springs School. The auditory trainers consist of a microphone for the teacher which transmits an FM radio signal to a receiver worn by the child. This enables the children to hear the teacher at the same volume no matter where the teacher is standing, facing, etc.

There is strong evidence that children who attend kindergarten score better in the basic skills of mathematics, spelling, language and reading and are less likely to have to repeat a grade, according to a recent study conducted by the Tennessee Department of Education. All five year olds in Sullivan County have the opportunity to attend kindergarten as a regular part of the school program.

Members of the Budget Committee have taken a tour of three of our elementary schools to see first-hand the needs that exists for renovation. The three schools visited were Miller Perry, West View and Weaver.

Our E.S.E.A. Title I Project under PL 95-561 allocates funds to assist educationally deprived children in eligible attendance area schools. During the 1980-81 school year, twenty-four elementary schools and six middle schools are eligible to participate in our program. The following services will be provided in our 81-01 project: sixty-eight Title I aides, eight reading teachers, consumable materials for the reading and math programs, the operation of a central resource center which includes a materials clerk and a van driver, two social workers, and an elementary Title I Summer School for eligible attendance area schools for grades one through eight. Six schools served as centers for an excellent Title I elementary summer school program with an enrollment of six hundred and forty-six students. Transportation, materials, and remedial instruction in reading, mathematics, social studies and science were provided for students in grades one through eight.

Report to Commissioners

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October 13, 1980

Sullivan South and North High Schools' food service has provided meals to over 2500 students daily. There have been several problems involving the integration of new personnel with new, untried equipment and new student bodies. After six weeks, the problems are fewer and the service is more satisfactory. The two schools provide a contrast in the style of service to the students. South has four traditional serving counters from which students select a variety of foods as they move down the counter. North has the double conveyer which carries the food selection by the students for their selection.


Costs of producing the meals for students have increased markedly as was expected. Food costs for September 1979 were \$.48 per plate; for the same month in 1980 food costs were \$.55. Labor costs increased by 6½%. As commodities are received to replace some of the purchased foods, the food cost will be reduced in actual direct cost. The students meal for the day continues to be the best bargain in the educational program.

There are 142 buses transporting students in Sullivan County this year. These buses transport 14,208 students each day, and travel in excess of 7,000 miles daily. We have completed inspection of all buses. All buses that failed the first inspection have completed the follow-up inspection.

As a newly elected Superintendent, I look forward to working with you in providing the best possible educational opportunities for our boys and girls. Major emphasis will be given to maintaining and improvement of our instructional program. I have tried to free our instructional supervisors from administrative tasks so they can give a greater percent of their time to the development and improvement of our instructional program.

Your support for our education program is appreciated.



Agricultural Work Area

The past quarter has been one of much concern for tobacco producers in that "blue mold" was causing considerable damage to plant beds and fields in the southern states with perdition for burley growers to be on the lookout for the disease if they had not treated their fields with a fungicide (Ridomil) prior to transplanting the tobacco. The expected damage did not occur during the growing season mainly due to the hot dry conditions that tend to suppress the blue mold fungus growth; however, some growers did have blue mold losses. Tobacco losses from the draught and high temperatures will probably range from 15 to 20 percent less than the 2300 pounds average yield for the county.

In July, Extension agents worked with local dairymen and the Holstein Breed Association representative in classifying 5 herds in Sullivan County. The classifier rates each registered animal according to the ideal type cow for the breed.

Dairymen suffered a 5 to 3 percent loss in milk production due to the high temperatures and draught conditions of pastures this summer.

Sullivan County producers marketed some 8000 calves in the organized state graded feeder sales this fall where they are grouped according to weight and sold in uniform lots to the highest bidder.

Swine producers throughout the county suffered financially with cheap prices for feeder pigs and slaughter hogs throughout the summer. Now that the hog numbers are down prices have strengthened somewhat. Hog producers that use good management practices are able to produce at a profit.

During July and August, agents assisted a large number of individual home owners that made requests with lawn problems being caused by the sod web worm and the Japanese Beetle grubs. In addition, several calls concerning trees dying from the Dutch Elm disease and dry weather.

In September, the majority of feeder calves are marketed from the beef herds throughout the county. The prices received by farmers this year for feeder calves has been about \$10 to \$12 per hundred weight lower than for the same grade of cattle sold last fall with the bulk of steers selling from \$65 to \$75 per hundred weight and heifers averaging from \$8 to \$10 per hundred weight less.

In addition to the routine work Extension agents took time to work with local dairy, beef producers exhibiting livestock at the Appalachian Fair at Gray.

Home Economics Work Area

Home Economics position is vacant but other agents continue to work with the women's programs in a limited capacity.

4-H and Other Youth Work Area

Summer workshops, district and state fair and 4-H camp and conferences made up a busy schedule this past quarter.

Ten 4-H members attended clothing workshops held to prepare 4-H'ers for the County 4-H Fashion Revue. Eighteen girls competed in the Fashion Revue held during the 4-H Fair on September 20 in the Bristol Mall.

A wildlife field trip was held at Warrior's State Park with 30 4-H'ers involved.

Workshops in arts and crafts involved over 80 4-H members during the three-day session in Kingsport and Bristol.

Ten contestants vied for the 4-H Dairy Princess title during the annual pageant sponsored by the Farm Bureau. Sara Rutherford, Bristol, was crowned the new princess for the coming year.

District Livestock Show in Knoxville was attended by 10 4-H members showing their project animals and 13 4-H members attended the Tennessee Junior Livestock Show in Nashville.

District 4-H Leadership Conference was held in Crossville, Tennessee this year with thirteen 4-H'ers from Sullivan County attending. Three of these were initiated into the District All-Stars.

The Sullivan County Poultry Show and Sale was held in Kingsport at the Kingsport Livestock Market with ten 4-H members showing and selling 125 sex-linked pullets.

Eleven 4-H Senior members competed in state project competition at 4-H Round-up in Knoxville July 38-August 1. Four of these were state winners and will represent Tennessee at National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago this fall.

One outstanding 4-H member, Melissa Baker, was chosen to attend the National 4-H Citizenship Shortcourse.

4-H Summer Camp, July 23 thru August 1 involved 33 boys and girls from Sullivan County.

During September, time was devoted to rescheduling and enrolling 4-H clubs within the county and city schools. Principals and leaders were contacted and visited.
